REMEMBERING HUSSEIN LUCAS

A Voice Who Told Summerhill's Story

It is with great warmth and gratitude that we remember Hussein Lucas—author, and passionate advocate of Summerhill's philosophy—who passed away a few years ago. Hussein's work continue to resonate deeply with our community, through his remarkable book, After Summerhill: What Happened to the Pupils of Britain's Most Radical School?


Hussein was a storyteller, one who came to understand the unique spirit of Summerhill through his interviews with exsummerhillians. In After Summerhill, he took on the big question that has long surrounded our school: what happens to children who grow up in an environment where they are free to choose, to play, to govern themselves, and—if they wish—to learn?

Through a series of thoughtful, candid interviews with former pupils spanning the decades, Hussein explored the real-world outcomes of a Summerhill education. The book paints a vivid picture of how our alumni navigated life after leaving the school's democratic and compassionate embrace, and how the lessons learned in freedom shaped their adult lives.

His work is more than a study. It is an oral history, a love letter, and a mirror held up to the school. It shows us that while Summerhill has changed in many ways over its long history, it has never lost its soul. Hussein's book reminds us that our values of trust, self-direction, and community have a lasting impact.

We are proud that Hussein Lucas chose to dedicate a part of his life to telling its story with such care and curiosity. His legacy lives on in the pages of After Summerhill and in the ongoing journey of every child who walks through our gates.

Thank you, Hussein, for telling the world what it means to grow up in freedom.





Wednesday 12 th March 2025

In line with many other schools nationally, a group of Summerhill students and staff spent the whole day focussed on the history our school community and how Summerhill grew from a seed of an idea into a school with a history spanning over 100 years.

The day was made possible, and incredibly worthwhile, by the tremendous energy and enthusiasm generated by a group of our older students, all currently in their first year studying an IGCSE History course.

As a member of the SARA the Schools Archives and Records Association I had received an email encouraging its members to participate in a day of exploration of its school's history. I tested the waters for interest and to my delight all members of one of my history groups, six in total, decided that the idea sounded exciting and were prepared to dedicate a day to the project. I was also delighted that some of my colleagues were prepared to work alongside me and the students, making it a truly community-based study.





We followed a number of varied themes across the day, using packs of photocopied materials original source materials from in the Summerhill Archive. These materials were supplemented by slide presentation a explaining the purpose of the A. S. Neill Summerhill Archive; a tremendously engaging Q&A with Zoe and lively discussions about 'How to begin sorting a box of ephemera' and 'Reflecting Neill's talents on and <u>achievemen</u>ts. We also spent time in the Archive to begin to appreciate how the original source materials are stored and collated.



Some reflections on the day's activities by the students involved:

"...My favourite part was figuring out information from the pictures and not just having someone tell me what happened... I also enjoyed it when you, Zoe or someone else would give us extra little bits of information to add on."

"I enjoyed every aspect of it and would like to continue... I learned a lot of interesting stuff about the school."

"...I would do another day..."

"Wednesday was lots of fun and very informative... I especially enjoyed looking at The Archive and would love to do more of that..."

"...Overall, it was an amazing day. It would be hard to pick a favourite activity, but I do know that I absolutely loved the archives. Seeing history and being able to touch it was so surreal. I am honestly jealous that you [Stephen] get to see it so often. I would love to be included in the next one... thank you for making it happen."

"...It was fun exploring and a good way to learn about Summerhill."

The Trust also works to promote the re - publication and translation of existing books, new books, overseas visits by school staff to give talks, school visitor days at Summerhill as well as Summerhill pupils visiting other schools to run workshops on children's rights and democracy. Each year the trustees consider several applications for bursaries towards school fees. Because our funds are limited, we can currently award bursaries only to current pupils. Parents should contact the school office for information on how to apply for a bursary from the A.S.Neill Summerhill Trust.

A very big thank you to all our donors who have so generously supported the spirit of Summerhill. Your donations help kids remain at the School who would otherwise have to leave, and provide extracurricular activities that would be beyond the School's ability to provide.
